	Voiceover:	<p>TX-KEA provides you with several different reports. You will see this drop-down menu used frequently as we review the reports available to you. The reports can be completed at the class level, campus level and district level. The Completion Report tracks completion of required assessments. The Class Summary Report allows districts to view children's performance across all subject areas by classroom. The Custom Score Report allows districts to view Wave 1 Literacy Screener Scores and Wave 3 Dyslexia Screener scores. The percentile rank score report translates raw scores for each subtest and converts them to percentiles. Then, you can see how a student scores between the 1st %ile to the 99th %ile making it easier to compare scores where the score varies across each measure. It's a different scale that is available to help you analyze your data. The Growth Report allows districts and teachers to view children's gains over time throughout the school year comparing each assessment window. The Student Report for Teachers allows districts to view children's performance across all subject areas by individual student. Teachers can communicate students' strengths and areas needed for growth with parents by accessing the Student Report for Parents which connects families to activities that enable them to support their children at home. The Grouping Report groups children with scores below age-related benchmarks and recommends activities for further skill development.</p>

TX KEA Progress Monitoring and Instructional Planning

ON TRACK

The score indicates a developed understanding and the student will benefit from more upward scaffolding.

MONITOR

The score indicates only a fundamental understanding and the student will be helped by more scaffolded supports.





SUPPORT

The score indicates an underdeveloped understanding and a need for more intensive intervention. Additional formative assessments can help define targeted support needed.

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	Voiceover:	<p>TX-KEA uses color to help convey the meaning of each score. It provides benchmark scores to administrators, teachers and parents. Benchmark scores summarize a student's skills and abilities on subtests based on their performance. . The three levels are: on track/green, monitor/yellow, and support/red. If a student scores on-track for a subtest, it means that her score is above the cut-off score that indicates she is developing as expected. A score of "monitor" means that a student's skills should be monitored in that developmental domain to ensure that adequate progress is made. A benchmark score of "support" suggests that additional assessment is recommended and possibly Tier 2 support.</p>



Class Summary (Percentile Rank) Reports show the percentage of scores that are at or below a score. For example, a subtest score at the 75th **percentile** means that the student's score is greater than or equal to 75% of other students' scores.



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	Voiceover:	<p>The percentile rank report translates scores for each subtest and converts to percentiles. It's a different scale that is available to help you analyze your data. The percentile ranks are an average. For example, a subtest score at the 75th percentile means that the student's score is greater than or equal to 75% of all the other students. This can be viewed at the student, class, campus and district levels. It's a way to view standard scores. The percentile scores are also color coded to indicate benchmarks. The percentiles are based on each subtest within the domains and range from 1-99.</p>

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Voiceover:

To create the “Class Summary (Percentile Rank)” report, you will click on the same “Reports” button used previously. This time, you will select the “Summary Report (Percentile Rank)” button from the drop-down menu to open a new window. You will then select the language of assessment and the wave as well as ALL subtests administered which you wish to view in the report.

At the bottom of the page a blue button saying “Summary Report (Percentile Rank)” is available. Once you click the button, a PDF of your report will automatically be generated.

In order to view the individual student’s percentile rank, you’ll need to view the “Student Report for Teacher” and select “Percentile Rank”. You will hear more about the “Student Report for Teacher” later in the course.

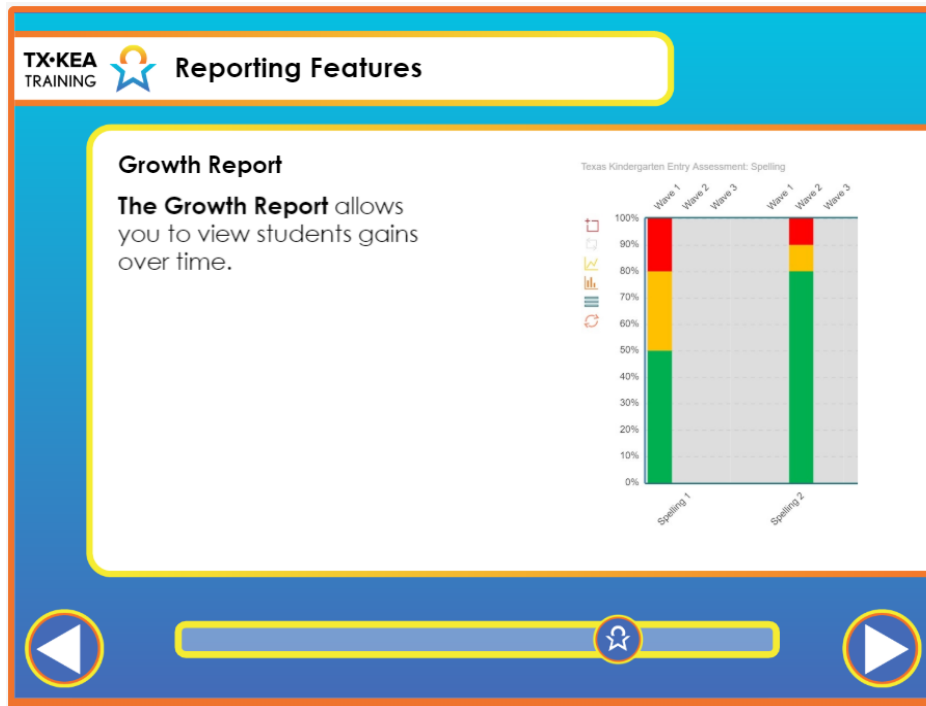

The growth report allows teachers to view children's gains over time. The Growth Report displays a bar graph indicating student % meeting benchmark on selected measures compared to waves of administration. Student average scores for the selected measure can also be viewed.

In this example report you can see that 20% of the class needs support as noted in red at wave 1. Then at wave 2, only 10% of the class is needing support.

This gives the teacher and administrators fresh data from which to set goals for instructional refinement and improvement.



- Locate the Reports button at the top of the student view page
- Select the Growth Report button from the drop down menu
- Select report type: **Average Scores or Percentage of Class Meeting Benchmarks**
- Select the language, waves of assessment and subtests
- Click the "Class Growth Report" button



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	<p>Voiceover:</p>	<p>The Class Growth Report can also be generated by utilizing the reports button. Once you've selected "Growth Report", a new window will appear. The system will then require you to select whether you would like to have a growth report that gives you average scores or a growth report that measures the percentage of your class that meets benchmarks. You will then select the language of assessment. Next select the waves of assessment. Then, you will select any of the subtests you wish to check for growth over time. Once you have made all of your selections, click the blue "Class Growth Report" button at the bottom and your Growth Report will be generated. You will have the option to export to a PDF.</p>
	<p>Say:</p>	<p>"Remember, the Growth Report displays a bar graph indicating student % meeting benchmark on selected measures compared to waves of administration. Student average scores for the selected measure can also be viewed. I will first take you to the How to Guide link on Engage so you can see how users are walked through accessing reports step-by-step. Then, we'll navigate to that part of CLI Engage to generate a growth report of our own to review."</p>
	<p>Trainer Tip:</p>	<p>Have teachers generate a class growth report based on the instructions given to them in the How to Guide link. Have teachers see if they notice any trends regarding student growth. Are there any specific areas in which all the students are struggling? Have teachers reflect on how they might embed more lessons throughout their teaching day to target the areas where growth is needed.</p>



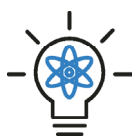
This window for student reports looks similar to one viewed earlier. Notice that the “Student Summary” button at the top left is selected by default. Then, as seen in the sequence at the top of the screen, you will first select the assessment wave. Next, you will select the student’s name. There is also a button that says “Entire Class.” Simply click the “Entire Class” button to generate a “Student Report for Teacher” for every student in the class.

The subtests that were administered to the student are preselected. However, the subtests selected can be modified to select the ones you want to view. Once you have done this, click the “Scores” button at the bottom of the window. This will create a pdf that shows how a particular student or your entire class scored on the selected subtests. You will also be given the option to view the scores in black and white or color.



Say:

“Remember, the student report for teachers or student summary provides a comprehensive look at a child’s progress over time. If you are unable to remember in the future how to access this report, you simply go to the how to guide section on CLI Engage. These short video clips paired with step-by-step instructions are helpful. Let’s go to the link now and watch the short instructional clip and then we’ll navigate to this part of CLI Engage in the assessment practice area.”

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	<p>Voiceover:</p>	<p>Now let's address a different type of report - the Student Report for Parents. The purpose of the Student Report for Parents is to provide specific information to parents about how their child performed on each TX-KEA subtest. The Student Report for Parents looks similar to the Student Report for Teachers, with a few differences intended to help parents make sense of their child's scores. First, it includes information that explains the TX-KEA assessment as well as guidance on how to interpret scores. The page that follows contains the report showing their child's scores for each subtest administered, along with a parent friendly description of the subtest and what it measures. Teachers have the option to share additional information with parents, including links to home activities to support specific skills. We will review these options later in the course. The Student Report for Parents can be shared two ways. You can generate and print these reports to send home with students, or they can be shared electronically.</p>

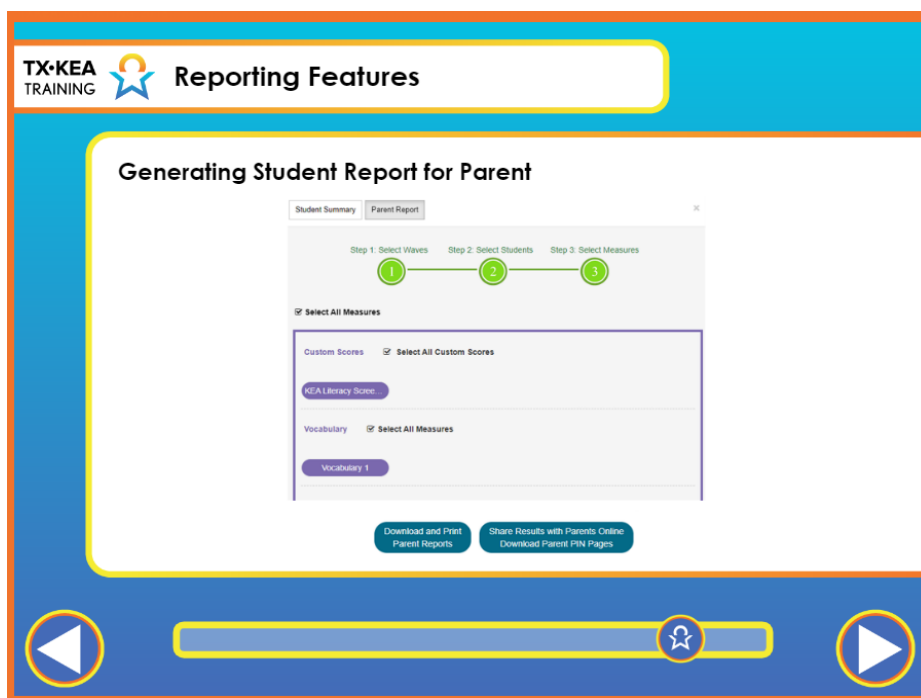

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	Voiceover:	<p>We will start with how to generate the Student Report for Parents to send home with students. You can print a Student Report for Parents for just one student, or for every student in the classroom. Begin by locating the Student Report for Parents button from the Reports dropdown menu. Clicking on this button will open a window for making your report selections.</p>

Locate and select the “Parent Report” button as seen at the top of this window. Then, as noted in the sequence just below the Parent Report button, you will first select the wave of assessment. Then, you will check a particular student in your class and a report will only be created for that student. If you would like to create a Student Report for Parents for all students in the classroom, you may click the “Entire Class” button.

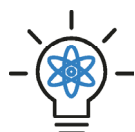

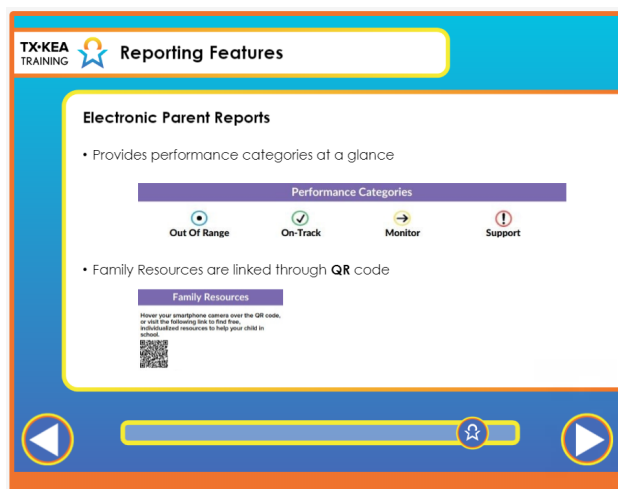

Voiceover:

CLI Engage also offers the option of sharing reports with parents electronically. The Student Report for Parents informs families that their child's teacher designs lessons to better meet their child's individual needs. Teachers are able to communicate those needs to the parents through this report. The report provides performance categories at a glance in all of the key domains assessed and details the child's scores using color coded performance categories. It also informs them that a brief literacy screener assessed skills in vocabulary, letter naming, and spelling ability at the beginning of the year.

Family resources for each report are linked through a QR code on the report. Each report includes: Playful activities to provide additional support and practice in specific learning areas based on their child's current performance, descriptions of the learning areas assessed, and how they are important for later school success and ways to prepare for their parent-teacher conferences.

Regardless of how this information is shared with parents, it's important to ensure that scores are provided to all parents and that parents understand the purpose of the assessment and how they can support their child at home.



Say:

"We all have a good understanding of the importance of sharing student data with parents in order for them to better support their children at home. As teachers, we can supplement our classroom data by connecting with families and getting a glimpse of their children at home. Teachers can share these feedback forms with parents to collect information on a child's development in these key school readiness areas. These forms relate to Texas Kindergarten Entry Assessment on CLI Engage. Let's take a look at your handouts. When might you find the information on these forms most beneficial? How could you use these forms to help with instructional planning?"



Trainer Tip:

Give participants five minutes to review the handouts and discuss the questions posed. Ask one volunteer to share their ideas with the group. Select one volunteer for the Emotion Management form, one volunteer for the Social Emotional Development form, one for Motivation to Read form, one for the Speech Production form and one for Fine Motor Skills. Let participants know these forms are also available in Spanish.

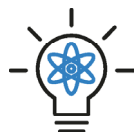
Our final report is the Grouping Report. As you learned in previous courses, TX-KEA can be used to inform instruction. CLI Engage offers a grouping tool that divides students into instructional groups based on assessment results to help teachers provide targeted small group instruction.

Click the activity links for “Classroom Activities” to view small group lessons designed to support skill development in each area.



Say:

“For example, here is an activity you might connect families with if their child is struggling with Social and Emotional Competence in the classroom as indicated by their assessment results. Let’s watch the demonstration video and take a look at your handout so you can see how easy it is for families to know exactly how to do the activity and embed it in their daily routines. You will notice when you explore the family collection more on CLI Engage, there are very few to no materials required.”

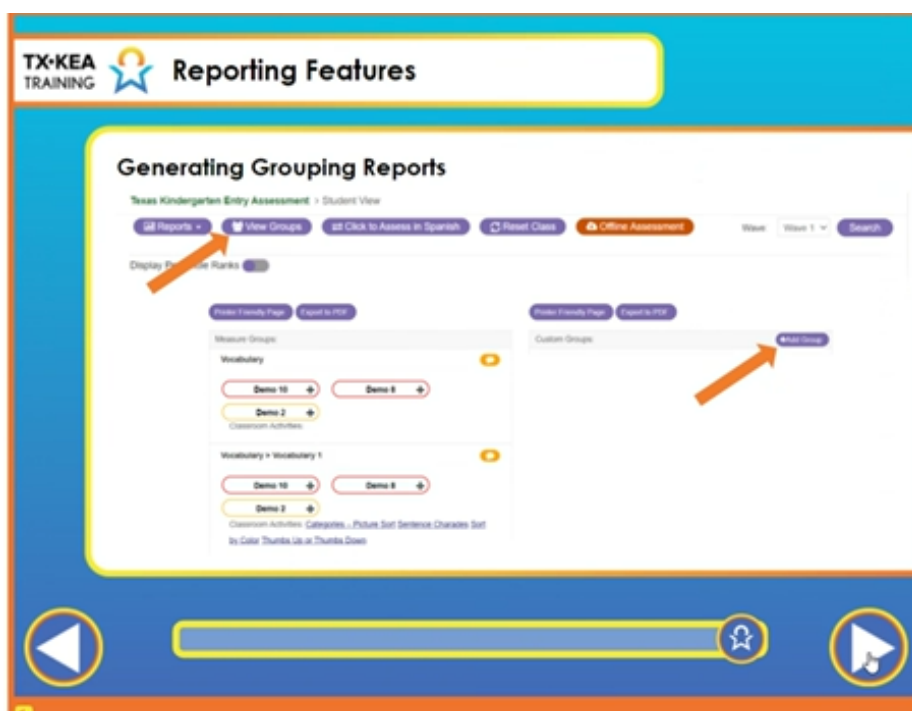

Voiceover:

The Grouping Report is accessed through the “View Groups” button located at the top of the student view page. After clicking the “View Groups” button, you will be taken directly to the Grouping Report. To generate the report, click “Export to PDF.”

Engage also offers a feature allowing teachers to create custom groups. You may do this by clicking the “Add Group” button. You will be prompted to name the group before adding students to the group. Then, click the button with the plus sign. A list of all students will appear so that you can select students to add to your custom group.



Say:

“Remember, the TX-KEA grouping tool breaks children into groups for teachers based on their assessment results. The groups contain children that have not yet reached the “satisfactory” level for each skill. These children need more practice with certain skills and will benefit from small group instruction. Let’s practice navigating to that section on CLI engage now as you will use this report frequently when lesson planning. When you click the View Groups button it will take you directly to the grouping tool.”



Trainer Tip:

Have teachers reflect on the students they viewed earlier in their growth report. Have them brainstorm how they may use the grouping tool to ensure these students are targeted in the areas they are struggling within a small group setting. Have teachers navigate to the grouping tool on CLI Engage after reviewing the How to Guide.





